Models of Collaboration – A Comparison

1. Background

- 1.1 There are several ways to establish a working arrangement between the schools, primarily under the headings of "clustering" and "ffederalising".
- 1.2 Clusters have existed for several years in Gwynedd.
- 1.3 When submitting a draft strategy to re-arrange Gwynedd primary schools in October 2007, a formal model of a federal school was outlined.
- 1.4 During September 2008, a consultation document was published by the Assembly Government which suggested an alternative model for establishing a federal school. A response was provided by Gwynedd Council. The final guidance has not yet appeared by the Assembly, but they are expected to come forward in the autumn of 2009. However, it is possible to discuss the basic features of the consultation document.
- 1.5 The following paper notes the main factors those that are likely and those that are different the three models.

2. General Points

- 2.1 The models of clustering, formal federalising and the Governments proposed new model of ffederalising have a number of similarities, including:
 - Maintain continuity and school attendance
 - merge two or more schools under the leadership of one head
 - offers opportunities for greater collaboration between the schools including sharing staff expertise
 - offer formal opportunities to bring children together for specific sessions
- 2.2 The models also have unique features. These are outlined in the table below.
- 2.3 It is noted that the analysis of the Government's model of federal school is based on the consultation document October 2008 and not on firm guidelines. These guidelines are expected during October 2009. Possible models based on the consultative document are projected in the table below.
