As one of the key partners of the Gwynedd and Anglesey Public Services Board, Gwynedd Council is required to offer a formal response to the consultation on the Board's Draft Well-being Plan. Below, there are seven questions from the consultation to which you are requested to respond.

1	Taking Objective 1 and the priorities to achieve this objective into consideration, do you think it provides the Board with a focus to be able to improve social, environmental, cultural and economic well-being?	These priorities are consistent with the improvement priorities in the Gwynedd Council Corporate Plan with the exception of one, namely the effect of climate change. Of course, the Council has more improvement priorities than the Board.
	Do you find any missing aspects that we should include in the plan, or have any general comments?	Limiting the Plan to a small number of priorities where we can make a difference is more sensible than promising and trying to do too much.
		3. We question whether 'the effect of poverty on the well-being of our communities' is the same as 'co-planning preventative services and activities to support families before the need for intense services arises'.
		4. It is considered that promoting the Welsh language, homes for local people and the effect of poverty on the well-being of our communities does place a focus on improving social, environmental, cultural and economic well-being of our communities.

GWYNEDD COUNCIL'S RESPONSE TO THE STATUTORY CONSULTATION ON THE GWYNEDD AND ANGLESEY PUBLIC SERVICES BOARD DRAFT WELL-BEING **PLAN** 5. The affordability of homes for local people should possibly be considered as part of Objective 1 also, as well as education and skills as a key way of enabling people to come out of poverty. 6. There is no reference to economic development in the draft plan and, consequently, increasing the wealth of local residents is a weakness in the proposals. It is noted that a lack of well-paying jobs is a need and a priority for residents within the Plan but it is not addressed in the priorities. 7. As is noted in the Draft Plan, there is a link here with the work of the North Wales Economic Ambition Board, however, we will need to take action locally to ensure that the growth generated as a result of the Board's activities translates into prosperity for the residents and communities throughout Gwynedd and Anglesey. 8. The need to extend and increase the value of the activity of traditional sectors, particularly in rural areas, are fields which require the Board's attention (as is evidenced in the Council Plan) particularly in a period of uncertainty following the UK's decision to leave the EU. 9. Employment is the main factor which ensures that individuals and communities are lifted out of poverty and the circle of deprivation is broken. Increasing the wealth of the residents of Gwynedd and Anglesey would contribute to sustaining intrinsically Welsh communities and would be a key part of responding to the need for homes for local people. 10. In relation to the Welsh language, the current priority may be too inward-

> looking with too much focus on the public sector rather than facilitating the use of the language in a broader sense. A range of the Council's

The following specific observations should be noted: In relation to health and care for adults, the Board has a key role to ensure appropriate opportunities to enable residents to live healthy lives. To this end, the provision of specific facilities, as proposed by the Council's Leisure Service, together with access to the coast and countryside is crucial. In relation to the welfare and success of young people, it should be noted that working with children and young people to increase ambition and prevent them from being exempt from the labour market is key in order to reduce the need for intense services now and in the long term. The important role that culture, the arts and heritage play in

promoting health and well-being activities for adults, children and

young people should also be noted.

		4. It is believed that a formal internal structure and mechanism is needed for the Councils and partner bodies on an 'operational' level to progress the objectives as this is currently lacking.
		5. Empowering communities should be a field of priority i.e. see what the community can provide and then build from that. Supporting community companies, community energy etc. would help to strengthen the economy.

		2. The plan would be better if it noted an action plan to realise the objectives.  Are there procedures in place to provide an action plan as soon as possible?

3. It is suggested that, if it is not possible to include specific action steps in the plan, there may be a need to note how it is intended to reach that point.

4. In accordance with the Equality Act 2010 an Equality Impact Assessment needs to be carried out on the Board's plans and equality features must be considered in their entirety as defined in the Act not only the deprived communities as referred to in the draft plan.

5. There is a need to look at alternative ways of addressing the priorities e.g. areas of the UK have seen budget cuts but an increase in community satisfaction - investing in projects to tackle loneliness which has led to a reduction in the use of medication. Social investment.

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
