

# GWYNEDD COUNCIL'S BIODIVERSITY DUTY PLAN 2017-19

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#### 1. INTRODUCTION

- 2. This plan has been published as part of Gwynedd Council's legal obligation, as set out in the Environment Act (Wales) 2016. The Environment Act enhances the previous Natural Environment & Rural Communities Act 2006 duty to require all public authorities, when carrying out their functions in Wales, to seek to "maintain and enhance biodiversity" where it is within the proper exercise of their functions. In doing so, public bodies must also seek to "promote the resilience of ecosystems". This duty applies to all public authorities such as the Welsh Ministers, local authorities, public bodies and statutory undertakers.

#### 8. GWYNEDD'S BIODIVERSITY

- 9. Gwynedd has a wealth of wildlife and a diversity of habitats. The beautiful coast of Pen Llŷn, with its soft cliffs and sandy beaches, is characterised by narrow lanes and distinctive cloddiau. In stark contrast are the windswept uplands and spectacular mountains of Snowdonia, which lead us dramatically down into green valleys and remnant ancient woodlands.
- 10. Our marine life is a rich variety of animals, including soft corals, sea anemones, fish, octopus and crabs, which populate the reefs and seabed around our coast. Gwynedd's coastal strip and abandoned slate quarries provide habitats for the chough, the rarest species of crow breeding in Britain. Approximately half of the Welsh chough population breeds in Gwynedd (including the Snowdonia National Park). Pen Llŷn, where mink numbers are still thought to be relatively low, is also an important area for the water vole. Gwynedd also has nine species of bat, including the critically endangered lesser horseshoe bat, which has disappeared from most of its northern range in Europe. It is no wonder that tourists flock to the area in their thousands during the year, and spill out into the countryside to marvel at our wildlife and spectacular landscape, or just to 'get away from it all'.
- 11. Our breath-taking landscapes and rich variety of wildlife are by no means secure however. Across Wales, and around the world, wildlife is being threatened by modern lifestyles. Threats include the dumping of waste on fragile habitats; new developments such as roads, houses, and shops for our ever-increasing population; changes within farming; and perhaps a lack of respect for something we all seem to take for granted.
- 12. In order to allow our children to inherit and enjoy Gwynedd's most prized asset we all have to take some responsibility for the welfare of our biodiversity, and play a small part in its conservation. Our two main industries in Gwynedd, namely agriculture and tourism, are inter-linked with our environment. It is essential that we all work together to promote a healthy local economy while at the same time protecting the wealth of spectacular local wildlife.
- 13. In 2005 the Natur Gwynedd Plan was published (Gwynedd's Local Biodiversity Action Plan) which aimed to provide a means of halting the decline in our biodiversity through the actions and efforts of the people who live and work here. Gwynedd Council's Biodiversity Duty Plan (2017) aims to build on the successes of the Natur Gwynedd Plan by taking a more holistic approach across the Council. The recent recession in the UK and Brexit creates new challenges for maintaining and enhancing our biodiversity. Therefore more than ever we need to ensure that we prioritise conserving our wildlife for generations to come in order to sustain healthy communities, environment and economy in the future.


#### 14.LEGISLATION

#### 15. Well-being of Future Generations (Wales) Act 2015

16. The Well-being of Future Generations (Wales) Act1 is about improving the social, economic, environmental and cultural well-being of Wales. The Act places a duty on public bodies listed in the Act to carry out sustainable development.

#### 17. Well-being goals

18. The seven well-being goals show the kind of Wales we want to see. Together they provide a shared vision for the public bodies listed in the Act to work towards by working better with people and communities. They are a set of goals; the Act makes it clear the listed public bodies must work to achieve all of the goals, not just one or two. In the Act, sustainable development means the process of improving the economic, social, environmental and cultural well-being of Wales by taking action, in accordance with the sustainable development principle, aimed at achieving the well-being goals.



#### 19. The Council's Well-being Objectives

- 20. The Council's day-to-day work and the improvement priorities are identified in the Council Plan 2018-23 and will contribute to the objectives below
- 21. Our well-being objectives for 2018 to 2023 are to ensure that Gwynedd residents can
- enjoy happy, healthy and safe lives.
- Live in quality homes within their communities
- Earn a sufficient salary to be able to support themselves and their families
- Receive education of the highest quality which will enable them to do what they want to do
- Live with dignity and independently for as long as possible Live in a natural Welsh society
- Take advantage of the beauty of the County's natural environment.

#### 22. Sustainable Development Principle

23. The Act puts in place a 'sustainable development principle' which tells organisations how to go about meeting their duty under the Act. The principle is made up of five ways of working that public bodies are required to take into account when applying sustainable development

The five ways of working are designed to help public bodies show they have applied the sustainable development principle.

#### Long term



The importance of balancing short-term needs with the need to safeguard the ability to also meet long-term needs.

#### Prevention



How acting to prevent problems occurring or getting worse may help public bodies meet their objectives.

#### Integration



Considering how the public body's well-being objectives may impact upon each of the well-being goals, on their other objectives, or on the objectives of other public bodies.

#### Collaboration



Acting in collaboration with any other person (or different parts of the body itself) that could help the body to meet its well-being objectives.

#### Involvement



The importance of involving people with an interest in achieving the well-being goals, and ensuring that those people reflect the diversity of the area which the body serves.

#### 24. Environment (Wales) Act 2016

25. The Environment (Wales) Act has been designed to complement the goals of Future Generations (Wales) Act by applying the principles of sustainable development to the management of Wales' natural resources. The Act puts the ecosystem approach into statute through a set of Sustainable Management of Natural Resources (SMNR) principles, which are based on the 12 principles (Ecosystem Approach principles) contained in the UN Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD).

#### 26. Sustainable Management of Natural Resources (SMNR) Delivery Framework

- 27. The SMNR delivery framework is an interconnected framework delivered through the Environment Act and the publication and review of the following:
- **28. State of Natural Resources Report** (SoNaRR) produced by NRW and will report on status of Wales natural resources and *will underpin the*
- **29. National Natural Resources Policy** (NNRP) produced by Welsh *Ministers* which will set out the priorities for sustainable management of natural resources at a national level. The priorities in the NNRP will be delivered at a *local level through*
- 30. **Area Statements** produced by NRW. These should involve local collaboration through the local partnerships.

#### 31. Habitats and Species of Principal Importance in Wales

32. Welsh Ministers must prepare and publish a list for the purpose of maintaining and enhancing biodiversity in relation to Wales. A new list (Section 7 list) of species and habitats of principal importance in Wales will replace the existing list of species and habitats of principal importance identified under Section 42 of the NERC Act.

### 33.COMPLYING WITH THE BIODIVERSITY AND RESILIENCE OF ECOSYSTEMS DUTY

- 34. This new duty under Section 6 of the Environment Act replaces the biodiversity duty in the NERC Act which required that public authorities must have regard to conserving biodiversity. The Environment Act enhances the current NERC Act duty to require all public authorities, when carrying out their functions in Wales, to seek to:
- 35. "Maintain and enhance biodiversity" where it is within the proper exercise of their functions. In doing so, public authorities must also seek to "promote the resilience of ecosystems".
- 36. A new reporting duty enables public authorities to report on actions taken to improve biodiversity and to promote the resilience of ecosystems and also what actions have been taken to incorporate biodiversity measures into other areas of policy, strategies or initiatives. Subsection 6(5) requires that in complying with the duty public authorities must have regard to the set of living organisms and types of habitat published under Section 7, the State of Natural Resources Report (SoNaRR) and any Area Statement.
- 37. Public authorities must take account of relevant evidence as required under the Act and will be required to prepare and publish a plan on how they intend to comply with the biodiversity and resilience of ecosystems duty. These public authorities must also review their forward plans in light of the findings in their report on their actions.
- 38. The intention is that the plan will be produced within the first year of the Act coming into force (May 2016-May 2017). The first report on complying with the duty must be published by 2019 and then every three years. Public authorities must also review their forward plans in light of the findings in their report on their actions.

#### 39. Nature Recovery Plan for Wales

- 40. The Nature Recovery Plan for Wales (NRP) sets out how Wales' will address the Convention on Biological Diversity's (CBD) Strategic Plan for Biodiversity. The NRP has been produced by the Wales Biodiversity Strategy Board, members of which represent both land and sea managers, Natural Resources Wales, the environmental third sector, local authorities, Wales Biodiversity Partnership and Welsh Government. These objectives will be used to identify and take forward action within Gwynedd Council to meet the Duty
- **41.** The objectives of the NRP are:
- 42. Engage and support participation and understanding to embed biodiversity throughout decision making at all levels
- 43. Safeguard species and habitats of principal importance and improve their management

- 44. Increase the resilience of our natural environment by restoring degraded habitats and habitat creation
- 45. Tackle key pressure on species and habitats
- 46. Improve our evidence, understanding and monitoring
- 47. Put in place a framework of governance and support for delivery

#### 48.GWYNEDD COUNCIL'S BIODIVERSITY DUTY PLAN

- 49. This plan has been produced to fulfil Gwynedd Council's legal obligation to the Environment Act (Wales) 2016 and is summarised below:
- **50.** An enhanced biodiversity and resilience of ecosystems duty which replaces the existing duty under the NERC Act. Public Authorities "must seek to maintain and enhance biodiversity in the proper exercise of their functions and in doing so promote the resilience of ecosystems".
- **51.** To assist in complying with the new duties public authorities must prepare and publish a forward plan on how they intend to comply with the new duty
- **52.** Relevant evidence must include Section 7 list of habitats & species, SoNaRR and any relevant Area Statement
- 53. The consideration of biodiversity should be embedded into their business plans including policies, plans, programmes and projects as well as day to day activities
- **54.** The Nature Recovery Plan contains six objectives in order to aid in developing biodiversity actions
- **55.** The first plan should be published by May 2017 and first report on complying with the duty should be published by 2019
- **56.** Forward or Biodiversity Duty Plans may be required as part of any submission to Welsh Government for funding and should also be linked to the relevant Well-being of Future Generations Act goals.
- 57. The following Biodiversity Duty Actions includes current actions by Gwynedd Council on maintaining biodiversity across all Departments within the ongoing constraints on budgets, resources and capacity as a result of the Financial Crisis
- 58. Future actions have also been included on how the Council aims to meet the new enhanced duty over the next two year. These actions will be monitored by the relevant Department over the next 2 years in order to review their progress and adjust

- accordingly. The Biodiversity Team will be responsible for collating the outcomes of these actions in order to produce the report in 2019.
- 59. In order to guide action to comply with the Duty the actions have been categorised under the relevant National Recovery Plan (NRP) objectives.
